time implosion driven by the internet and other communication technologies therefore it is argued that cyberspace provides a practical sphere to investigate into the unbundling of territoriality in a postmodern world in the first section the impact on territoriality resulting from the emergence of the cyberspace will be discussed ruggie s model of differentiation between systems of rule and territory is applied to explain the transformation of territory in the postmodern era of cyberspace it is followed by an investigation into the consequences of cyberspace on sovereignty showing that cyberspace does indeed provide a new stage in ruggie s terms facilitating an unbundling and relocation of sovereignty away from state territory the third section discusses the implication of the virtual space on the rise and acceleration of globalisation it is argued that globalisation could not be perceived as a postmodern phenomenon without the cyberspace revolution the last part of the paper proposes the need to rethink the notion of movement in the age of virtual and real spaces cyberspace allows tourists in line with bauman s description to choose between virtual and real movement the preceding discussion will finally lead to the conclusion that the conceptualisation of cyberspace as one aspect responsible for the unbundling of territory provides an important explanatory insight into the transformation from modernity to postmodernity this comprehensive book examines the crucial connections between national identity territory and scale providing a powerful theoretical and organizational
