throughout the civil war newspaper headlines and stories repeatedly asked some variation of the question posed by the new york times in 1862 what shall we do with the negro the future status of african americans was a pressing issue for those in both the north and in the south consulting a broad range of contemporary newspapers magazines books army records government documents publications of citizens organizations letters diaries and other sources paul d escott examines the attitudes and actions of northerners and southerners regarding the future of african americans after the end of slavery what shall we do with the negro demonstrates how historians together with our larger national popular culture have wrenched the history of this period from its context in order to portray key figures as heroes or exemplars of national virtue escott gives especial critical attention to abraham lincoln since the civil rights movement many popular books have treated lincoln as an icon a mythical leader with thoroughly modern views on all aspects of race but focusing on lincoln's policies rather than attempting to divine lincoln s intentions from his often ambiguous or cryptic statements escott reveals a president who placed a higher priority on reunion than on emancipation who showed an enduring respect for states rights who assumed that the social status of african americans would change very slowly in freedom and who offered major incentives to white southerners at the expense of the interests of blacks escott s approach reveals the depth of slavery s influence on society and the pervasiveness of assumptions of white supremacy what shall we do with the negro serves as a corrective in offering a more realistic more nuanced and less celebratory approach to understanding this crucial period in american history

africa is at once the most romantic and the most tragic of continents so begins the negro the first comprehensive history of african and african derived people from their early cultures through the period of the slave trade and into the twentieth century originally published in 1915 the book was acclaimed in its time widely read and deeply influential in both the white and black communities yet this beautifully written history is virtually unknown today as a wellspring of critical studies of africa and african americans it directly and indirectly influenced and inspired the works of scholars such as c Ir james eric williams herbert aptheker eric foner kwame anthony appiah and henry louis gates jr one of the most important books on africa ever written it remains fresh dynamic and insightful to this day the negro is compelling on many levels by comparing web du bois sanalysis with subsequent scholarship robert gregg demonstrates in his afterword that the negro was well ahead of its time du bois s view of slavery prefigures both paternalistic perspectives and the materialist view that the system was part of the capitalist mode of production on black contributions to the civil war and to the emancipation of slaves historians have yet to acknowledge all that du bois delineated in his discussion of reconstruction du bois preempts much later historiography his identification of segregation as an issue of class rather than race is almost forty years ahead of c vann woodward s similar thesis as to the matter of race du bois is clear that the concept is a social construct having no foundation in biology intellectually and historically prescient du bois assumed globalization as a matter of course so that his definition of the color line in the negro links all colonized peoples not just people of african descent with the resolution of the cold war and the ascendancy of the global market du bois s sweeping vision of africans and the diaspora seems more relevant now than at any time in the past hundred years

this historic book may have numerous typos and missing text purchasers can usually download a free scanned copy of the original book without typos from the publisher not indexed not illustrated 1907 edition excerpt appendix note 1 page 42 one of the best accounts of african cannibalism known to me is given in the ethiopian the human leopard society by j cameron grant charles carrington publisher paris 1900 as further illustrating this point i here insert a clipping from the evening star of washington d c thursday december 5 1895 p 10 which reads as follows men worse than apes the revolting cruelties practiced by many of the ferocious african tribes from the london saturday review the cannibalism of the black secret society known as the human leopards in the country near sierra leone disclosed by the recent trial brings forcibly before us the difference between the east african and the west african habits of eating human flesh the sherbro cannibals waylaid and killed their victims and afterward feasted on their flesh the cannibalism of the east coast is of a very different kind the flesh of the old people the grandfather and grandmother of a family is dried and mixed with condiments and a portion of this is offered with a dim sort of sacramental meaning to travelers who become guests of the family to refuse it would be a deadly insult to accept it is a passport to the privileged position of a friend of the house many of our travelers in east africa have eaten thus sacramentally of the ancestors of some dark skinned potentate the cannibalism of the west coast is as has just been seen of a more horrible kind the sherbro case seems to be connected with fetichism the worst developments of which are peculiar to that country but there is a hideously genuine appetite for fresh human flesh still existing among the negroes of west africa the cannibalism manifests itself in a refinement of gluttony

the characteristics of the negro are of two kinds the inborn and the inbred as they reveal themselves to us this distinction may not be seen but it exists inborn qualities are ineradicable they belong to the blood they constitute individuality they are independent or nearly so of time and habitat inbred qualities are acquired and are the result of experience they may be overcome by a reversal of the process which created them the fundamental or inborn characteristics of the negro may be found in the african as well as the american negro but the inbred characteristics of the latter belong to the american life alone
