torn between marital respectability with Olga the Russian ballerina who was his first wife and the erotic passion of his mistress Marie Thérèse this extraordinary biography ends with the completion of a dramatic series of drawings of the crucifixion from then on the horrors of war would replace any private horrors leading ultimately to picasso's masterpiece Guernica the third volume of richardson's producing the sets and costumes with Cocteau for Diaghilev's Ballets Russes and visiting Pompeii where the antique statuary fuel his obsession with classicism in Paris creating some of his most important sculpture and painting as part of a group that included Braque Apollinaire Miró and Breton spending summers in the south of France in the company of Gerald and Sara Murphy Hemingway and well his model and muse the author introduces material on the artist's early training in religious art and establishes his passion for Barcelona and Catalan modernism there are also portraits of a friend of the artist with a view to writing a biography the acclaimed art historian kept a diary of their meetings after picasso's death his widow Jacqueline collaborated in the preparation of this work giving richardson access to picasso's studio and papers volume one of this extraordinary biography establishes the complexity of picasso's Spanish roots his aversion to his native Malaga and his passion for Barcelona and Catalan modernism richardson introduces new material on the artist's early training in religious art re-examines old legends to provide fresh insights into the artistic failures of picasso's father as an impetus to his son's triumphs and includes portraits of Apollinaire Max Jacob and Gertrude Stein who made up the Picasso gang in Paris during the blue and rose periods john richardson draws on the same combination of lively writing critical astuteness exhaustive research and personal experience which made a bestseller out of the first volume and vividly recreates the artist's life and work during the crucial decade of 1907-17 a period during which pablo picasso and Georges Braque invented cubism and to that extent engendered modernism richardson has had unique access to untapped sources and unpublished material by harnessing biography to art history he has managed to crack the code of cubism more successfully than any of his predecessors and by bringing a fresh light to bear on the artist's often too sensationalised private life he has succeeded in coming up with a totally new view of this paradoxical man of his paradoxical work never before miguel dominguín dora maar peggy guggenheim and henri matisse to name only a few and central to the book is richardson s close friendship with picasso which coincided with the emergence of the artist s new mistress jacqueline roque and gave richardson an inside view of the repercussions she would have on picasso s life and work with an eye for detail an ear for scandal and a sparkling narrative style richardson has written a unique fast paced saga of modernism behind the scenes a tribute to the renowned picasso biographer sir john richardson 1924 2019 whose intimate account of the artist s had strongly emphasised picasso s spanish roots from malaga to barcelona the book ended in early 1907 with the 25 year old picasso having completed les demoiselles d avignon described by richardson as the most innovative painting since giotto and the first masterpiece of the 20th century the great painting serves as the starting pointing of volume 2 volume 2 covers only ten pivotal years in picasso s life at the heart of the book is cubism the book will cover his relationship with cocteau his affair with fernande olivier and the influence of women on his art the book ends as picasso gets on the train to join diaghilev in rome in 1917 the beautifully illustrated fourth volume of picasso s life set in france and spain during the spanish civil war and world war ii covers friendships with the wife richardson recounts the untold story of how his two great loves of 1915 17 successively turned him down these disappointments as well as his horror at the outbreak of world war i and the wounds it inflicted on his closest friends braque and apollinaire shadowed his painting and drove him off to work for the ballets russes in rome and naples back to the ancient world in this volume we see the artist s life and work during the crucial decade of 1907 17 a period during which picasso and georges braque devised what has come to be known as cubism and in doing so engendered modernism thanks to the author s friendship with picasso and some of the women in his life as well as braque and their dealer d h kahnweiler and other associates he has had access to untapped sources and unpublished material in the cubist rebel richardson also introduces us to key figures in picasso s life who have been totally overlooked by previous biographers among these are the artist s chilean patron collector and mother figure eugenia errázuriz as well as two fiancées the loveable geneviève laporte and the promiscuous bisexual painter irène lagut by harnessing biography to art history he has managed to crack the code of cubism more successfully than any of his predecessors and by bringing fresh light to bear on the artist s private life he has succeeded in coming up with a new view of inspired him in the studio in the 1950s his sculpture work evolved and he expanded into ceramics lithography printing and graphic design techniques this latest picasso exhibition from the gagosian explores how as both artists struggled to come into their own they each played vital roles in provoking the other s creative breakthroughs ultimately determining the course of modern art itself
